



NCEPOD Local Reporter Guidelines

What is NCEPOD?

NCEPOD aims to review medical clinical practice and to make recommendations to improve the quality of the delivery of care. We do this by undertaking confidential surveys covering many different aspects of medical care and making recommendations for clinicians and management to implement.

What is the role of the NCEPOD Local Reporter?

Your role will be to act as a link between the non-clinical staff at NCEPOD and the hospitals you report for. The two main areas of involvement that will be required of you are: compiling and sending datasets that are requested by NCEPOD, and identifying suitable sample cases for specific studies. For some studies we will also require your assistance in distributing questionnaires to clinicians but you will be made aware of this in advance of the data collection period for the study. It is hoped that by providing Local Reporters with information about the studies in advance they will have the opportunity to contact the relevant clinicians to inform them about the study and what will be required of them. Any support you may be able to offer these clinicians, such as assistance with the retrieval of medical records, would be much appreciated although it is not an essential part of your role as Local Reporter. NCEPOD will keep you informed of up and coming studies by means of a newsletter that is distributed quarterly.

Frequently Asked Questions

Q. Is participation in the work of NCEPOD mandatory?

A. Yes, participation in NCEPOD studies has been mandated by the Department of Health and the General Medical Council.

Q. Do Clinicians receive CME points for completing questionnaire?

A. Completing an NCEPOD questionnaire requires the consultant to review patient notes and answer a series of questions related to the management of patients under their care. This process gives them an opportunity to reflect on various aspects of patient care. This activity has continuing medical and professional developmental merit. Consequently, NCEPOD recommends that consultants who complete NCEPOD questionnaires keep a record of this activity which can be included as evidence of internal / self directed Continuous Professional Development in their appraisal portfolio.

Q. Does NCEPOD require patient consent?

A. No, we have approval from the Patient Information Advisory Group (PIAG) under Section 60 of the Health and Social Care act 2001 to use patient data without consent.

Q. What happens if I no longer feel able to do this role?

A. Please notify us if you are not able to carry on this role and, if possible, provide us with an alternative contact. If you cannot provide us with an alternative contact we will contact the Medical Director to nominate someone else.
